BARNARD SAVOYARDS OFFER A DOUBLE BILL

In the second round of their summer-theatre experiment at the Minor Latham Playhouse, the Barnard College Gilbert and Sullivan Players are presenting the double bill of "H.M.S. Pinafore" and "Trial by Jury."

The troupe is composed of youthful singers imbued with a lively and confident spirit. The costumes they wear are uncomplicated, light, gay and eminently suited for the current condition of temperatures. And their choice of program is excellent. For both "Pinafore" and its complementing "Dramatic Cantata" are possessed of many virtues, among these being lilt-ing, sweet music and delicious humor.

But for all these advantages, the young verse singers are not sufficiently experienced nor properly gifted fully to realize the potentialities of the operetta. Their voices, for the most part, are not developed and it will be many semesters before they can achieve or even approach the true touch of the professional.

While the shortcomings on-stage are many, a five-piece orchestra conducted by Arthur Komar functions with special distinction. It consists of young women playing two violins and a cello, a flutist and a young man at the piano. Their musicianship is free from dissent and highly pleasing. They are well-trained and expert.

The twin bill will be repeated Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Other attractions scheduled for the summer are "Ruddigore," and "The Pirates of Penzance," L.C.

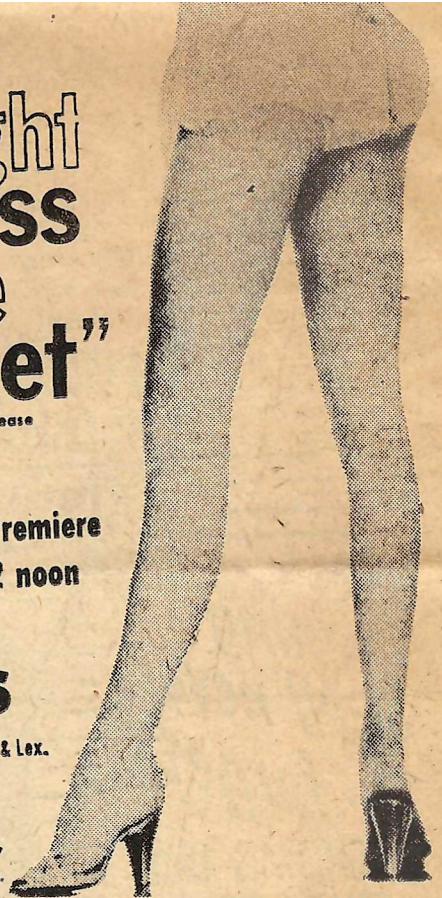
